Hours of Operation

Regular Hours: 10 a.m. – 5 p.m. Tuesday – Sunday and on Mondays which fall on a major holiday.

Summer Hours: 10 a.m. – 5 p.m. daily from Memorial Day through Labor Day; 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. on Saturdays.

The Museum is closed on a variety of holidays, including Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Eve and New Year's Day.

Membership includes one year unlimited Museum and Memorial admission for the cardholder, additional Museum and Memorial general admission and/or Featured Exhibition/Wylie Gallery tickets at half price, free or reduced admission to Museum and Memorial education programs, a 10% discount in the Museum and Memorial Store and *Over There* Café, exclusive members-only tours and events, \$10 off bricks for placement in the Walk of Honor and more.

Walk of Honor

The National WWI Museum and Memorial's Walk of Honor offers a lasting remembrance, carved in granite, of those who must not be forgotten. Several sections of the Walk of Honor are reserved for military service. Bricks are also placed in honor of individuals who have positively impacted their family, friends or community.

Education and Events

Edward Jones Research Center

The 20,000-square-foot Edward Jones Research Center houses a comprehensive historical collection of World War I materials. The library and archives of the Edward Jones Research Center are open to the public Tuesday through Sunday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. There is no charge for admission to the Edward Jones Research Center, which is located on the lower level of the Museum and Memorial.

Museum and Memorial Store

Visitors can browse a wide variety of World War I related items from logo souvenirs to a comprehensive selection of books ranging from personal accounts to battle histories. For collectors, there are museum quality airplane replicas and period poster reproductions. Purchases can also be made online at shop.theworldwar.org.

Over There Café

With its delicious food and distinctive ambiance, the Buffalo Fund's *Over There* Café offers both lunch and snacks, including vegetarian and gluten free options. The café's World War I décor includes flags representing participant countries, a poppy mural and glass etchings of songs from the era. Those songs and others can be heard throughout the dining area.

J. C. Nichols Auditorium

This state-of-the-art auditorium seats 230 with overflow capacity in the auditorium lobby. The auditorium is utilized for many of the Museum and Memorial's educational programs and is also available for rental. The auditorium lobby provides ample space for meetings and catered meals.

R. A. Long Education Center

The R.A. Long Education Center houses a classroom, multi-purpose room and conference room which can be used to host school and corporate on-site learning experiences. The rooms are available for rental. School curricula based on the Museum and Memorial's comprehensive collections are offered for area educators.
